According to Merrells, J., Buchanan, A., & Waters, R. (2019), young adults with disabilities who received long-term individualized community-based coordination continued to experience significant social exclusion and segregation, leading to negative outcomes in their lives. Despite efforts to promote community integration, these individuals faced substantial barriers to employment and often reported feelings of boredom and disengagement. Moreover, their social connections were primarily confined to family and other individuals with disabilities within formal programs, underscoring the need for more inclusive and community-based initiatives to promote social participation and address the persisting disparities faced by individuals with disabilities [5].
